Advent: A Time of Hope

By Giada Smith--We all know about the time of year that we celebrate the four weeks before Christmas--Advent. During Advent, we prepare for the coming of Jesus. At Trinity Catholic School, each classroom celebrates Advent.

In grades 4-6, the students worked on activities every day in a little booklet called *Absolutely Advent*. Some of the preschool students made advent wreaths out of paper tubes and construction paper. Several classrooms made Jesse Trees, where you cut out a tree shape from paper and then attach colored ornaments to the tree that have symbols celebrating Jesus's ancestors. The ornaments are placed on the trees daily starting at the bottom and finishing with Jesus at the top.

All classes participated in our live-streamed Monday Advent Prayer Services. Stories and scriptures shared by Father Morisette and some 6th grade students. The services were held in the 6th grade classroom. One student also lit the candles each week. The three purple candles represent hope, faith and peace, while the pink candle represents joy. Some Advent wreaths also include a white candle, the Jesus candle that is lit on Christmas day.

Our school also attended the Feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8th. We celebrated the immaculate conception of Mary, Jesus's mother.



The Legend of St. Nicholas

Saint Nicholas was born into a wealthy family. His parents wanted him to become a priest because they wanted to repay God for answering their prayers. When both of his parents died from an illness he was orphaned and went to live with his uncle who was the Bishop of Patara. Nicholas was ordained by his uncle around his adulthood.

Emperor Diocletian, who was the emperor at this time, punished the people who didn't worship the Roman Gods. Nicholas was one of the people who had gotten arrested. But after Emperor Diocletian resigned, Constantine the Great freed all of the prisoners. St. Nicholas left Partara to go to Myra. While he was there the archbishop had passed, and the local priest had a vision that night from God that told him to pick the first person who walks by the church the next morning and make them the new archbishop. And the first person to walk by the church was St.Nicholas, and at first he refused but then accepted.

Nicholas took on the garb of his position, red robes trimmed with gold with a red bishop's miter, or hat. Over time his manner of dress slowly changed into the red suit, trimmed with the fluffy white, and the red and white hat you see him in today.

Christmas Trees: Then and Now

By Wilson Metcalf--The first historical reference to a tree being decorated for Christmas was in Riga Latvia around 1510. In Germany decorating trees became a lot more popular in the 1600s. They first used live spruce or pine trees, and would usually be decorated by apples, candy, and real lit candles. Trees were traditionally put up 12 days before Christmas and taken down twelve days after.

Today the Christmas tree is the center of many traditions during the Christmas season. The Christmas tree now is typically decorated with electric stringed lights and a wide variety of ornaments, treats and other foliage. At the top of the tree a star or an angel is very common. Today many trees are artificial and can come in a variety of colors and shapes. Some families still do have live trees that they cut down or purchase from a tree farm. Most families will put up their tree the day after Thanksgiving and take it down shortly after Christmas.
