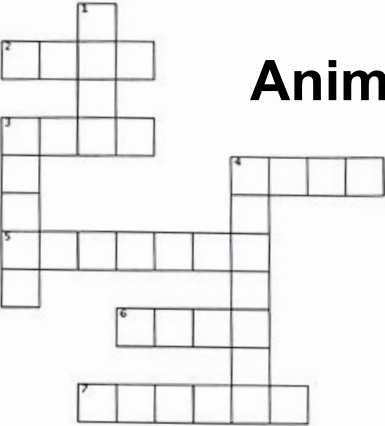

By Anna Canale--The Mother Cabrini Health Foundation is a mission to improve the health and well-being of New Yorkers. This is one of the largest foundations in the U.S. They give grants to veterans, special needs individuals, children, adults, low-income families, pregnant women and other people in need.

In the Diocese of Syracuse there are 22 Catholic Schools. Money awarded to the Diocese includes: \$60,000 to Improving health and wellness through nursing care and physical education. \$500,000 toward Scholarships for Scholars, and \$1,003,620 for Team Health Catholic School.

Thanks to the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation Trinity Catholic has received many things. We have received a rock wall for the gym, Fifty Chromebooks, headphones and cases for students, and for the first time last year, we began having a school counselor in the building. The grant sponsored the better breakfast reading challenge in September. Trinity Catholic School's older students will be given breads to bake and share in December. We celebrate Saint Francis Xavier Cabrini on November 13th, her Feast Day.

Meet Saint Francis Xavier Cabrini

Nora Newell--Saint Francis Xavier Cabrini was born on July 15, 1850 as Maria Francesca Cabrini in Lodigiano, Lombardy, Italy. Sadly because of the time Frances would be very sickly most of her life. Frances was very dedicated to living a religious life and she enrolled in a school run by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart. She graduated with high honors and a degree for teaching. When Frances was 18, she wanted to become a nun but they told her that she had poor health and she could not join them. They asked her to teach at the orphanage in Cadagono, Italy. In 1877, she became Mother Cabrini; she also added Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier. Frances wanted to go the China, but Pope Leo XIII urged her to go to the United States which had a lot of Italian immigrants who needed her help.(an immigrant is a person who moves from one country to another). On March 31,1889, Frances arrived in New York City along with six other sisters ready to help. Although the job was not easy Frances did not give up. Eventually Frances founded an orphanage in what is now West Park, New York and known as Saint Cabrini Home.

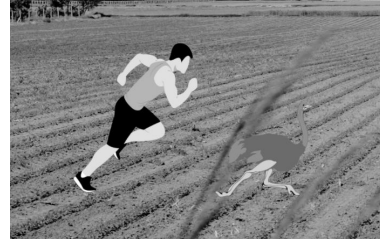
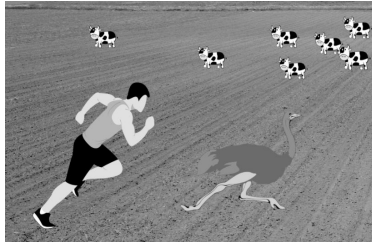
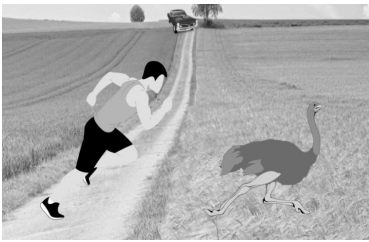
Spotlight--Community Service

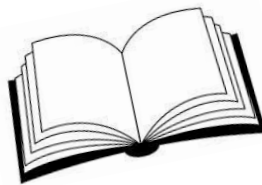
